Children's Eye Photoscreening Program

Six years ago, Lions Clubs in Sussex County, Delaware began administering a free vision screening program to test for amblyopia or "Lazy Eye" in Pre-K and Kindergarten in the Indian River District's elementary schools. The program has been such a success—and has been so well received by parents, school teachers, as well as administrators—that Delaware Lions are now taking this initiative statewide. O.J. (Ash) Ashinhurst, currently the 1st Vice President of the Fenwick Island Lions Club, initiated the program six years ago in Sussex County. Ash comments that "the program had some pretty humble beginnings. A handful of Lion volunteers, a single machine and an apprehensive school system. The first year we screened less than 250 children. But, when the parents and schools realized the potential good that comes from this kind of early detection, they quickly embraced our efforts." Over the years, the Lions Clubs have acquired the required sophisticated equipment, secured the funding and built a program that, for the first time last year, was able to offer the screening process to all pre kindergarten, Head-start, Project Village and kindergarten children, county wide."



Amblyopia

A Greek word simply translated as "dull eye", and commonly referred to as "lazy eye" results from a set of childhood vision disorders that affect how the brain processes unequal or abnormal visual input from the eyes. The brain literally shuts off the bad eye and slows its development in relation to the good eye. If left uncorrected, amblyopia may lead to irreversible vision loss. Amblyopia develops most rapidly in the early years of the child's life and affects 3% to 5% of all American children. The need for early detection of amblyopia and the factors which cause amblyopia is widely recognized. Amblyogenic factors include:

- Strabismus - Both eyes cannot be directed to the same object;

Where should I inject my regular insulin to get the most consistent absorption?

We recommend you use your abdomen. Insulin injected into the abdomen is absorbed quickly and predictably so you know how it will affect your blood glucose time after time. In general, there are three places to inject insulin: the abdomen, the arms, and the legs. Several factors affect the way your body absorbs insulin. If you exercise the muscles of your arms or legs vigorously after an injection, more insulin will be absorbed more quickly. It will be difficult for you to predict how this insulin will affect your blood glucose. Warm temperatures also increase the speed at which insulin is absorbed. Because your abdomen is usually covered by clothing and stays warm, insulin is absorbed more rapidly from this area.

- Anisometropia - A large difference in the power between the two eyes creating an unequal image size seen by the brain;
- Hyperopia – Extreme farsightedness;
- Myopia – Extreme nearsightedness; and
- Astigmatism – Large amount of unequal focusing of the light rays as they enter the eye, causing a blurring of the object.

Early Detection and Treatment

Amblyopia is usually more easily treatable if addressed at an early age. Unfortunately, the majority of children do not receive proper eye examinations until they enter school. In many cases, it is a condition that cannot be easily detected by a parent or guardian. Sometimes amblyopia is even missed during screenings by health practitioners.

Photoscreening Process

The Lions vision screening program is based on the use of photoscreening technology for the detection of amblyopia. Photoscreening methodology is relatively simple. Two photographs of the child's eyes are taken with a special Polaroid camera and high-speed film. Trained interpreters analyze the photographs to detect amblyogenic factors, looking for crescent marks and shadows that appear in the photographs if the child's eyes are not focusing properly. The procedure is non-invasive and no eye drops are necessary. Photoscreening is only a screening process and is not a substitute for a professional eye examination. Vision screenings are not necessary for children who are currently fitted with glasses or whose eyes have recently been examined by an eye care professional. The screenings are performed by Lions club volunteers who are trained in the operation of the camera and vision screening procedures.

“Ash” recently commented that what makes our program so successful—and has enabled it to grow as it has—is that an Optometrist from Selbyville, by the name of Dr. Jeffery Hilovsky, fondly known to all as “Dr. Jeff,” has from the beginning volunteered to do the readings...” Ash said, “for the past six years he has been working hand-in-hand with our program and has consistently given our work a priority. Without his assistance, dedication, hard work and enthusiasm, this program would never have gotten to this stage.” Dr. Hilovsky, who is a Lion himself, very modestly downplays his efforts... which seem to be a common trait in many Lions who give so generously and unselfishly of their time, expertise and energy.

Once the photographs are read, if an abnormality is detected, the parents are notified that the child should be taken to an optometrist or ophthalmologist for a comprehensive vision examination. Ash points out that “probably the most important part of our job is to see that those children that are identified as needing further attention actually obtain it... This may require follow-up with the school nurse, and/or the parents or guardian... If there is an issue of a parent’s inability to pay for the required examination and/or follow-up treatment and glasses, the Lions will step in to help.” It should be noted that to participate in this program parental or guardian consent is required before the screening can be performed. This service is provided by the Lions at no cost to the parent/guardian or the sponsor of the screening. Vision screening is a good beginning to proper eye care. A screening does not replace a professional examination, but it can help identify children at risk for eye disorders. Finding eye disorders in their early stages saves SIGHT.

A BIT OF MD-22 HISTORY

PDG James Minnich



At the recent pin swap held by the Western States Pin Traders in Reno, NV, Lion Jim Minnich was given a 1947 MD22 Convention Badge by fellow pin trader Lion Bob Libin of New York. This badge commemorated the Silver Jubilee Convention in Washington D. C. Lion Jim did his homework and found that, according to the History of MD22 written by PDG Ed Hall of the Dover Club, in 1946-47, the District Governor was Joseph Errigo of the Christiana Hundred Club. Highlights in the Annual Report included a dinner in Milford honoring Secretary General Melvin Jones. Among the featured convention events were a golf tournament and a double-header ball game. Ladies at the convention received "appropriate silver favors". Newly chartered Clubs during 1946-47 were: Clayton, New Castle Hundred, Georgetown, Hockessin-Yorklyn, Rehoboth, and West Brandywine. Delaware became District 22-D. The International President appointed Samuel Pierce of Seaford as District Governor.



Lions Day at the UN March 14, 2008

To celebrate the historical [relationship between Lions and the United Nations \(UN\)](#), attend the **30th Annual Lions Day with the UN on Friday, March 14, 2008, in New York City.**

Highlights of the day include:

- presentations by UN speakers;
- an appearance by the Secretary-General of the UN (invited);
- awards ceremony for the grand prize winner of the Lions International Peace Poster Contest;
- a special luncheon with UN ambassadors;
- presentation of Lions-UNICEF School-in-a-Box banner patches;
- an optional tour of the historic UN building.

History

The relationship between Lions Clubs International and the UN began after the end of World War II.

In San Francisco, California, USA, on October 24, 1945 (forever known as UN Day), U.S. President Harry Truman joined Britain's Prime Minister Winston Churchill and other world leaders in signing the UN charter.

In the same year, Lions founder Melvin Jones and Past International Presidents Fred W. Smith and D.A. Skeen were asked to help develop the non-governmental organization (NGO) charter for the new global organization. At the time, Lions Clubs International was already an established worldwide service organization.

During the ensuing years, the two organizations have cooperated on many humanitarian ventures. Lions have provided aid and manpower for UNICEF (United Nations Children's Fund), WHO (World Health Organization), and UNESCO (United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization) projects.
