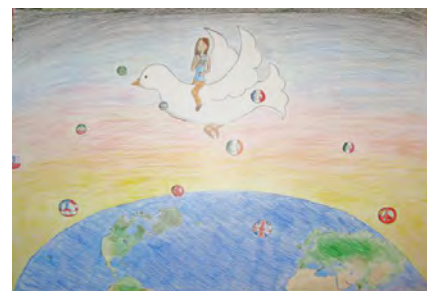

Diabetes Corner:

How do I protect myself against low blood glucose while I am trying for tight diabetes management?

Keep glucagon handy for emergency treatment of severe low blood glucose. If it is not an emergency, a food source of glucose is the way to go. Glucagon raises blood glucose. In many ways, it does the opposite of what insulin does. You get glucagon from the pharmacy with a prescription from your doctor. Someone in your household must know how to mix up the glucagon and inject it if you become severely hypoglycemic, confused, and unable to swallow food. This will need to be done quickly. Glucagon will raise your blood glucose within 10-15 minutes, but its effect doesn't last long. Eat some crackers after you become fully conscious again. Some people are nauseated after receiving glucagon. Most severe episodes of low blood glucose happen during your sleep, so to prevent your family from having to search for the glucagon, keep it in one place, such as the refrigerator door.

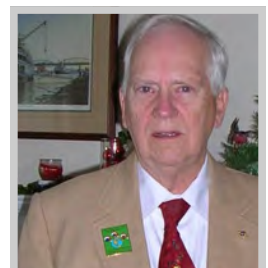

Region 3 Lions Club Visually Impaired Christmas Party

On the night of December 2, 2008 the Millsboro Civic Center was filled with Christmas cheer. The Lions Clubs of Region 3 held a Christmas Party for the Visually Impaired of Sussex County. Nearly 55 visually impaired and over 180 Lions, Lioness, Leos and guests enjoyed the catered dinner, Christmas music, fun, fellowship and the fabulous Steel Band from the Southern Delaware School of the Arts.

The following letter was received from a guest at this years' party. It explains exactly why we stand out in the heat selling raffle tickets, or freeze in the winter with fruit sales, in order to raise money to sponsor this type of event. **Here is an excerpt of her letter:**

"My husband and I were among the lucky guests to be invited to your Christmas Party on December 2nd. I am 65 years of age and until October 2007 I worked a full time job in a local office. Overnight my life was turned upside down. I lost my sight, with no warning, due to a stroke in the optic nerve in my right eye and optic neuritis in my left eye. I can see nothing but soft shadows. This last year I lost my job, financial security and most of my self confidence. The road has been long and filled with doctor visits, tests, pain, worry and fear.....I did not know what to expect when we arrived as your guests last night. I had to sit down and thank you so much for a wonderful evening. It was the highlight of this very long year. The food was wonderful, the entertainment was amazing. The fruit basket is so very much appreciated and the ornaments that were made by young and caring hands will be treasured. Thank you so much for the support, your time and generosity in caring about others like myself. I also want to be sure to say what a great group of kids. We don't hear enough about these kinds of young people; you made my Christmas."

I believe she has said it all. It's great to be a Lion!

- 5) Conduct vision screening for the kids.

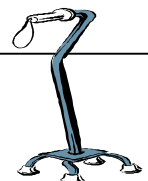
