Diabetes Corner:

What is my "health care team" and how can I find these health providers?

In addition to your doctor, you need someone trained to help you with the day-to-day challenges of living with diabetes. Diabetes educator nurses and dietitians, plus your doctor, are the core members of your health care team.

A certified diabetes educator (CDE) is a health professional (registered nurse [RN], registered dietitian [RD], pharmacist, physician, etc.) who has been trained and "certified" as an expert in diabetes education and management.

If you cannot find a CDE, you may find a nurse or RD interested in diabetes and willing to help you. Ask your doctor if he or she knows someone with diabetes experience. You can locate a CDE in your area by calling the American Association of Diabetes Educators (AADE) Awareness Hotline at (800) TEAM-UP-4. They will ask for your zip code and help you find a CDE near you.

You may also want to look for a diabetes-education program that offers individual or group classes. The American Diabetes Association has a list of "recognized" diabetes programs in your area. Call (800) DIABETES or go to www.diabetes.org for this information. If there isn't a recognized diabetes center near you, call your local hospital and ask about a diabetes education program or diabetes educators on staff.

2010-2011 International President Taking Lions to New Heights



His club in North Carolina adopted families in need, so Sid L. Scruggs III and another Lion walked through the woods to a rundown trailer. The mother had terminal cancer. When the Lions dropped off a box of food, the mother wanted to talk. “I have two small children and I can’t do much for them. How will they remember me?” recalled Scruggs. Scruggs flew planes for a living. But he is a husband, a father and a Lion. So he gently assured her. “They’ll remember you loved them and cared for them,” he told her. Scruggs knows those kinds of experiences will define his year as our leader. He’s given back as a community leader and a Lion and he wants Lions everywhere to rededicate themselves to hands-on service.

One of Scruggs’ favorite Lions activities is the three-day Visually Impaired Person (VIP) Fishing Tournament in North Carolina. More than 500 people participate. Scruggs enjoys baiting hooks, seeing familiar faces and talking with the participants. He doesn’t stand by or stand back; he jumps right in.

Driven to Succeed

Scruggs has a drive to excel. He knows where it came from: His sports-filled childhood and a parent who encouraged him. His father worked for the Chattanooga Times newspaper. He also played the piano, wrote music and championed the underdog. His mother “was very competitive. She loved to win,” says Scruggs. “She never cut me any slack.”

Neither did his coaches. In a track meet, his coach, Buddy Gedrun, walked away when Scruggs’ broad jump was poor. “I am not watching if you are not putting your best effort in every jump,” he explained. On the next jump “I literally jumped out of the pit and set a record,” he says. But the importance of that day paled in comparison to a defeat on the wrestling mat. Scruggs was ahead but relaxed and lost with one second to go. “I quit with victory one second away. That one defeat has driven me all my life,” he says.

Scruggs excelled in the classroom and was accepted to the Naval Academy. After graduating, he entered the Naval Aviation program at Pensacola, Florida, and received his “Wings of Gold” in 1961. He was assigned to an aircraft squadron aboard an aircraft carrier and made cruises in the Pacific Ocean. He was also an Admiral’s Aide. While serving as a flight instructor in the Advanced Jet Training Command he left the Navy to take a pilot’s job with American Airlines.

Family Man

Scruggs met Judy the night he bought his first car. While at the Naval Academy, one of Scruggs’ best friends set up a blind date for him. That evening Scruggs made a wrong turn on a one-way street. Two police officers “invited” him to the police station. Scruggs called Judy to say he was at a police station and he would be a little late. When he arrived, she sent her roommate to check him out. Her roommate gave him a “thumbs up” and the date was on. “He’s a very caring individual,” says Judy. “I saw that early on even before we were married.”

The two were married in the Naval Academy Chapel. While Sid was in the Navy, they had three children, Cyndi, Debbie, and S. Lee, IV. Their fourth child, Kevin, was born later. The kids were their focal point in their family life. Scruggs took an active interest in his children’s education – even helping to found one school and run another. Sid and Judy also volunteered with various youth activities.

Lion Trailblazer

Scruggs joined the Vass Lions in 1992. The club had 18 members and a dozen active members. Scruggs volunteered to be membership chair. “We don’t need any more new members,” his sponsor told him. Scruggs found them anyway.

The club expanded and became more active in the community. Scruggs helped start a Leo club and his club became more involved with the local schools. Membership grew to more than 65. Scruggs helped energize and transform his club. He also helped bring in women members and form specialty clubs, such as the Raleigh Elite Lions Club, composed of people with vision impairments and employed at the Raleigh Clinic for the Blind, where Scruggs serves on the board.

Beacons of Hope

The Scruggs have shared a full life and Lions have been a big part of that. “The difference for me with Lions is that it’s hands-on. I can go back and recount the stories of the difference we made in people’s lives,” says Scruggs. Lions are “Beacons of Hope,” he says. For the next year Scruggs will bring his message of hope to Lions worldwide. “I think people see things as they are,” he says. “Lions are different. We see things as they can be.”

Special Olympics of Delaware

2010 Marked the 40th anniversary of the **Special Olympics of Delaware—Summer Games**. They were held at the University of Delaware in Newark on June 11th and 12th and over 900 athletes participated during this two-day period. This year, Lions Sharon and Bruce Schoonover volunteered to assist in the Healthy Athletes-Opening Eyes program as did Indian River High School Leos Emily Bergman and Max Wilkinson. *Max and Emily are shown at right administering vision test to an athlete.*

Special Olympics is an international movement which, through year-round sports training and competition in the Olympic tradition, gives people with intellectual disability the chance to strengthen their character, develop their physical skills, display their talents and fulfill their human potential.

The mission of Special Olympics is to provide year round sports training and athletic competition in a variety of Olympic-type sports for children two years of age and older and adults with intellectual disability (or other significant learning or vocational problems), giving them continuing opportunities to develop physical fitness, demonstrate courage, experience joy and participate in a sharing of gifts, skills and friendship with their families, other Special Olympics athletes and the community.

Special Olympics Delaware (SODE) is a not-for profit, volunteer organization that serves as the motivational framework within which sports training and competition opportunities take place for those individuals eligible for the program who reside in Delaware. Primary movers in this non-profit organization are the University of Delaware, DuPont and Aramark, but participants are numerous, including Lions Club International and the Lions Clubs of Delaware.

The Summer Games include a BBQ party for the athletes, at which time the Torch Runners (who have completed their 161-mile race from Rehoboth Beach) are welcomed by a “cheer line” and then all the athletes participate in the Opening Ceremonies, including the Parade of Athletes, indoor fireworks and much, much more. During the games themselves athletes participate in numerous events, including aquatics, track & field, bocce, power lifting, the Motor Activities Training Program, tennis and softball.

The Healthy Athletes program of Special Olympics is a health screening and educational program for the athletes. The program’s goal is to improve each athlete’s ability to train and compete in Special Olympics through better health and fitness. In 2010, all athletes were offered vision screening—(Opening Eyes) a non-invasive dental exam—(Special Smiles), flexibility testing and stretching tips—(Injury Prevention/Flexibility) and learning about the negative effects of tobacco—(Be Tobacco Free.) Each component of the Healthy Athletes Program is administered by local volunteers with professional expertise in that discipline.

It was clear from our participation that Special Olympics is an incredibly inspiring and richly rewarding program for the athletes, their coaches and all who volunteer their time in a myriad of ways. It is equally clear that this experience was very much in keeping with the Lions mission to serve and to meet humanitarian needs of our community and the world. However, once again, we feel we were the ultimate beneficiaries of our efforts.

Has anyone thought about advertising their club on their car or truck? For \$65.00 for a car or \$95.00 for a truck, you can do just that. I worked with Sign – A – Rama north of Dover, DE., phone 302-678-9727 to create these signs. These signs are made of vinyl and are good for two to three years. The signs that are on my car are 10”H X 20”W and the signs on my truck are 14”H X 20”W. The sign on the truck tailgate is 12”H X 20”W and cost \$45.00. The price will vary depending on the size of the sign. By using Sign – A – Rama a club can use the same set up that I have and only change the phone number and email address. This will save you money. The cost of the sign can come out of the administrative account if your club approves the expenditure. If several clubs coordinate the purchase of the signs, you may be able to negotiate a lower cost.

I know that people notice the signs because I have been asked about Lionism, club location, eye glasses drop off, where can I get help with hospital equipment to use, and do lions build ramps for the needy? I think this type of advertising is a great way to inform your community that the local Lions Club is here to help people in need.
