Our Name

In 1931 an article in the Lion Magazine explained: “Our name was not selected at random, neither was it a coined name. From time immemorial, the Lion has been the symbol of all that was good, and because of the symbolism that name was chosen. Four outstanding qualities — Courage, Strength, Activity, Fidelity— had largely to do with the adoption of the name. The last mentioned of these qualities, Fidelity, has a deep and peculiar significance for all Lions. The Lion symbol has been a symbol of Fidelity through the ages and among all nations, ancient and modern. It stands for loyalty to a friend, loyalty to a principle, loyalty to a duty, loyalty to a trust.”



Message from Cabinet Treasurer

There's been a lot of confusion about the new requirement for Lions Club to file with the IRS. Here are the facts:

EVERY Club must get a so-called Employer Identification Number (EIN), and EVERY Club must annually file a version of the Form 990 with the IRS. If the Club's gross receipts are normally less than \$25,000 a year, they need to file a Form 990-N Electronic Postcard, by going to the website www.irs.gov/eo and following the instructions. If the gross receipts are normally more than \$25,000 a year, they need to file a longer Form 990-EZ or 990, which can be filed either on-line or by mailing a paper copy.

The annual deadline for filing is November 15, for the Lions year ending the previous June 30. HOWEVER, if you have never filed before, you have to file your first Form by October 15, 2010, or the IRS will repeal your tax-exempt status.

If your Club has a Foundation, then both the Foundation and the Club must separately have EINs and must separately file Form 990s. This is because the Foundation and the Club qualify under different paragraphs of the Internal Revenue Code.

Lioness and Leo Club receipts should be reported on the sponsoring Lions Club 990.

22D Lions joined the MD22 MERL teams in Beltsville, MD sharing ideas and plans, helped high energy teams get motivated and start the engines roaring for a successful Lions Year. The agenda included PID Joe Gaffigan, leaders of each District, and all Phases of MD22 MERL.

Gaffigan explained the new teams would be the GMT (Global Membership Team) expansion to MER (Membership Extension Retention) with retention expanded to meet regional needs. MLT (Membership Leadership Team) for leadership must work with the MER team with major emphasis on providing Guiding Lions training for many members. Good Guiding Lion skills have proven to be the key for successful Lions Clubs. The one theme stressed was ATTITUDE AND FOCUS. "Believe and Succeed" was also key for all leaders. International President Sid Scruggs' program has every program needing to be evaluated quarterly. Scruggs' plan concentrates on: sight, elderly, youth, hunger, environment and disaster relief.

Every attendee committed to assist the leaders of every club to become a model of success within the communities they serve. They will keep a sharp focus on each club's activities. Local Lion Leaders are expected to identify problems. MERL must help analyze and assist with solutions and implementation. Many success stories will come when there are Orientation programs for both the new and current members in the local plans. More leaders need to attend the seminars and institutes available to our Lions, such as Camp Merrick, Emmitsburg MD22 Institute, USA Canada Leadership Forum. We need a structured plan for club membership orientation to help the retention of members. Three person teams can make a tremendous difference.

PCC Grant Curtis has an abundance of information for: Friendship Nights, Letters of invitation, Member-Get-A-Member referral forms, Applications, Activities for clubs, Membership Socials, Membership Ideas, Steps to plan a one-day event, Year round Growth Award Programs, 60 Hints for Membership Retention, and order forms for free materials. There are many videos available in the district and on-line. The three person membership teams need to participate in seminars and training to become effective developers of strong Lions. MERL members are available to assist anytime.

The extension will be successful when sponsors are selected who have experience in activities. They need to know community connections and identify projects that will have an impact on the community. Essentially, why are we Lions?? Public awareness can only come from constantly providing items to be noticed. Let's get the name and logo onto buses, local and state fairs, and in local publications. Exposure is needed to explain and sell Lionism.

Let's not forget our own seminars and Annual Officers Training each spring. Let's make our leaders become effective at training their successors. In order to lead projects, all clubs must be participating in the local community at every level. MERL teams need to assist clubs making three year plans. MERL teams have many resources available to strengthen the retention rate, aid with diversity, and follow up procedures. Don't forget to practice your Lions Elevator Speech.

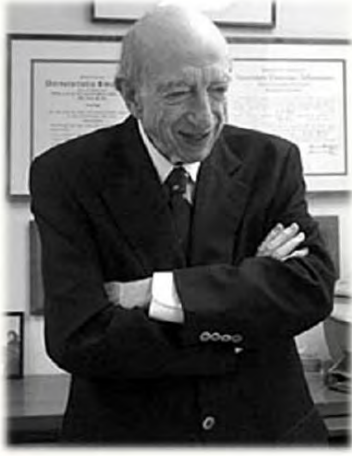

With dozens of blood glucose monitors on the market, how do I choose the one that's right for me?

Picking the right monitor is a little like choosing a car—you have to think of the features that matter most to you. And there are lots of features to choose from. Are you looking for the fastest monitor? There are some that complete the check in 5 seconds. Other monitors have larger screens that are easier to see if your vision is not good. Some use strips that are easier to handle if you have arthritis or nerve damage. Looking to get organized? There are monitors that have lots of data management capabilities, which can help you track your results more precisely and communicate these results to your health care provider. There are monitors that use very small drops of blood and others that let you test on your hand, arm, or leg, as well as your finger.

So you see, there are lots of options. To choose the monitor that's best for you, talk to your health care provider. Or better yet, talk to a diabetes educator; he or she will probably be up to date on all the latest models and have some available for you to see.

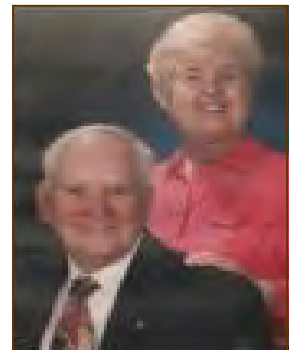

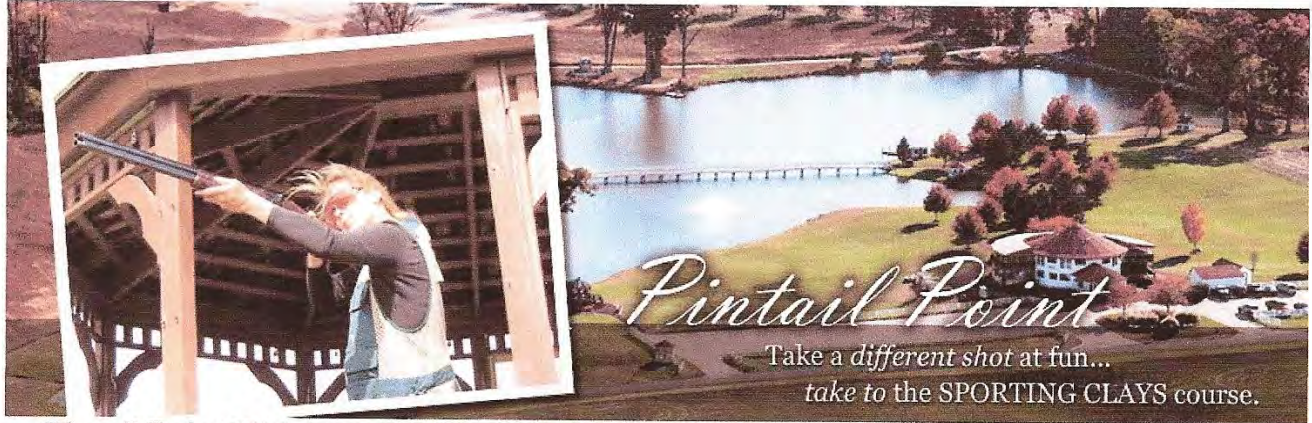
