Diabetes Corner:



Is it okay for me to eat snacks?

Absolutely! In fact, snacks can be a very important part of your meal plan. Many people think of snacks as the same as "junk food." This is not always the case. Snacking can be healthy and can help you avoid being hungry all the time. It can be designed to fit your needs and your diabetes management plan. However, snacks must be included in your total meal plan. Don't overdo snacks just like you don't overdo eating your regular foods. One way to do this is to schedule your snacks. It is often helpful to have your snacks at the same time each day.

What time of day do you get hungry: mid-morning, mid-afternoon, evening, all the time? Choosing healthy snacks may get you through the day without overeating. Healthy snacks do not have to be "fat-free" either. If not eaten too much, fat is an important source of energy. Talk with your diabetes care team to help you plan for a tasty snack like a bagel pizza. The Snack, Munch, Nibble Nosh Book is available through the ADA bookstore and has many healthy snack recipes.

LION OF THE YEAR AWARD
2007-2008

Lions:

A. PURPOSE:

1. To provide recognition to the Lion in District 22-D who most distinguishes him or herself as an active and contributing member of both their Club and the District during the current Lion year.

B. NOMINATIONS:

1. The name and qualifications of the nominee should be submitted to the Board of Directors of the nominee's Home Club and if it is approved, forwarded to the Vice District Governor. If the nomination is made by someone other than a club, it shall be forwarded directly to the Vice District Governor. Regardless of the source, each nomination must meet all the other criteria to be eligible for inclusion in the judging.
2. Each entry must be postmarked on or before April 1st of the year of the Multiple District 22 Convention.
3. The Region Chairperson should encourage each Local Club to nominate a worthy Lion in order that there is at least one (1) nominee submitted from each region.

C. ELIGIBILITY:

The Candidate must meet the following basic qualifications:

1. Must be a member in good standing of Lions Clubs in good standing in District 22-D according to Lions Clubs International and must have been a member of a Local Club in District for at least twelve (12) months.
2. Must be current in the Club obligations of attendance, dues, and committee assignments.
3. Must not be the Council Chairperson, the District Governor, the Vice District Governor, the Immediate Past District Governor, or a Vice District Governor Candidate.
4. Must not have received previously the District 22-D Lion of the Year award.

Lions Day at the UN March 14, 2008

To celebrate the historical [relationship between Lions and the United Nations \(UN\)](#), attend the **30th Annual Lions Day with the UN on Friday, March 14, 2008, in New York City.**

Highlights of the day include:

- presentations by UN speakers;
- an appearance by the Secretary-General of the UN (invited);
- awards ceremony for the grand prize winner of the Lions International Peace Poster Contest;
- a special luncheon with UN ambassadors;
- presentation of Lions-UNICEF School-in-a-Box banner patches;
- an optional tour of the historic UN building.

History

The relationship between Lions Clubs International and the UN began after the end of World War II.

In San Francisco, California, USA, on October 24, 1945 (forever known as UN Day), U.S. President Harry Truman joined Britain's Prime Minister Winston Churchill and other world leaders in signing the UN charter.

In the same year, Lions founder Melvin Jones and Past International Presidents Fred W. Smith and D.A. Skeen were asked to help develop the non-governmental organization (NGO) charter for the new global organization. At the time, Lions Clubs International was already an established worldwide service organization.

During the ensuing years, the two organizations have cooperated on many humanitarian ventures. Lions have provided aid and manpower for UNICEF (United Nations Children's Fund), WHO (World Health Organization), and UNESCO (United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization) projects.

From the beginning, the relationship between Lions Clubs International and the UN has been limited to humanitarian endeavors. In keeping with its stated Purposes, Lions Clubs International has no involvement in the political or security affairs of the UN.

In the November Eye Bank Blast we talked about keeping up to date with the latest equipment available and providing the best service in the country for our clients. We now serve nearly 100 cornea surgeons in the Delaware Valley area and around the world. Because of your generosity, we were able to update our services through the purchase of a DAsex System that has been installed in our lab. This is a \$50,000 system used for precutting Corneas- one of the latest techniques developed by researchers. The machine is in and our Lab Techs are being trained to properly use it. This is one of the reasons why we fund raise.

Above picture is the latest class of Gene Polgar Fellows who support our Endowment Fund. You will recognize many- Jim Minnich-Chairman-Gene Polgar-COO, Recipients Robert Moore-PID, Marion Goldberg, John Allen, Jim Quirk-Executive Vice President and David Smith CEO.

During the last half of the year, we harvested: From Delaware- 73 corneas of which 48 were used for local surgery and 3 exported for surgery,

From New Jersey 100 corneas of which 65 were used for local surgery, 17 exported for surgery and 14 used for research and training. Pennsylvania 329 Corneas harvested, 214 for local surgery, 36 exported for surgery and 9 for research and training.

Who qualifies for the Student Member Program?

Students – The eligibility definition of "student" is as follows: A student is an individual enrolled in an educational institution and between the age of legal majority in the jurisdiction in which they reside and through the age of 30.

Students who join existing clubs must be invited and approved by the club's board of directors. Club secretaries complete the

Student Member and Leo to Lion Certification Form to report qualifying members.

Active Membership: Students remain Active Members, entitled to all rights and privileges and subject to all obligations which membership in a Lions club confers or implies.

Student Member Dues Rate: Students receive a special dues concession, paying only half International Dues of US\$19.50 and are exempt of any entrance fees. It is further recommended that districts and multiple districts consider exempting or lowering their dues for student members as deemed appropriate.

Extended Billing Adjustment Period for Campus Lions Clubs: Campus clubs receive an extended billing adjustment period for the semi-annual billing in order to accommodate the typical school schedule. Campus clubs now have through April 15 for the January per capita billing and through October 15 for the July per capita billing to amend the club roster. Lions Clubs International will give credits to campus clubs for roster adjustments submitted within this time period without penalty.

Student Member Program Frequently Asked Questions

The Student Member Program began July 1, 2007. This is a permanent program that was ratified as part of the Lions Clubs International Constitution.

Who qualifies for the Student Member Dues Rate?

Students enrolled in an educational institution and between the age of legal majority in the jurisdiction in which they reside and through the age of 30. Student members are required to provide documentation verifying school enrollment and age.

Do current students in Campus Lions clubs qualify?

Yes. Campus club students qualify for both the reduced dues rate and the extended billing adjustment period. However, students not involved in a Campus Lions club do not receive the extended billing adjustment period.
