Dear fellow Lions,

I want to update you on LCIF's response to the devastating 7.9 magnitude earthquake that struck central China on Monday, May 12. LCIF is mobilizing US\$1.5 million to aid Lions-led relief efforts in China.

Lions and LCIF are already responding to the powerful, massive earthquake. Lions in Hong Kong and Macau have raised US\$600,000 and LCIF has committed an initial grant of US\$500,000 to address immediate needs and provide medicines, clothing, blankets, water purification and temporary housing.

Local Lions have already sent 5,000 tents for displaced victims, and more are on the way. Through a vast network of Lions clubs members in Hong Kong and China, Lions and LCIF are also dispatching relief teams to the affected areas to deliver supplies and assist with hands-on relief efforts.

The Foundation expects donations from Lions around the world to surpass US\$400,000 in the first week. Your donations will support both immediate and long-term reconstruction efforts. Every dollar that you donate will go directly toward the relief efforts in China. Please visit the LCIF Web site to contribute.

For more information about LCIF's relief efforts for the Chinese earthquake, please view the Foundation's Web site. This page will continue to be updated regularly with response efforts. Please distribute this release to your local media.

Together, Lions can bring a sense of hope and healing to those greatly affected by this disaster.

Diabetes Corner:

Where can I get more information on insulin sensitizers?

Insulin sensitizers are a relatively new type of oral medication approved for type 2 diabetes. They can be effectively used with other medications and have allowed many individuals to stop insulin injections and use only oral medications. The first medication on the market was troglitazone (Rezulin). Unfortunately, it caused severe liver problems in a small percentage of patients and was taken off the market. Currently, there are two FDA-approved insulin sensitizers on the market: rosiglitazone (Avandia) and pioglitazone (Actos). So far, they have not been shown to cause liver problems, although they have been shown to cause heart failure in a very small percentage of patients and there are questions about whether they may contribute to other cardiovascular problems as well. You should be aware that these medications might cause you to retain fluids, which may require you to take a diuretic (water pill). Metformin also increases sensitivity to insulin but is not usually thought of as an "insulin sensitizer." Its primary function is to decrease your liver's production to make glucose.

Information on each of these medications may be obtained from the company's Web site. Ask your doctor or diabetes care team if you have any questions.

Hearing Legislation

A new bill has been prepared and will be introduced this session of the Delaware Legislature. I feel that LIONS of Delaware should all be interested in supporting this bill for the benefit school age children. As you may recall- similar legislation was pushed for in 2002- but fell short of being passed. I would hope that all Lions Clubs in Delaware could be enticed to call the representative in their area and ask that this bill be co-sponsored , as well as voted for when it comes before the respective house. There are 2 additional amendments that are being added.

1 - is to increase the money to be spent to \$1500.00 rather than the present \$1000.00

2- the second is to increase the age limit to 25 years- thus giving college students the opportunity to get a hearing aid before graduation that could be replaced by them after graduation- when they are earning their own way.

This legislation could do more than help Lions with the cost of aids. It would help children with a hearing problem- hear- because the LIONS got involved. If there are any questions let me know.

The above house bill- requiring insurance carriers to pay for hearing aids passed the house on May 13th. It will be introduced in the Senate later this month.

It would behoove us all to contact our State Senator as well as Thurman Adams, asking them to please introduce and pass the Senate bill which will make the legislation law in Delaware.

The limits are \$1000.00 for children 0 to 25 yrs old. The amt and age- may change in the Senate, but we should ask for the support of the legislators.

CSF II Team Delaware,

Be advised that as of last night we are now at 100% Club participation for CSF II. A great big "THANK YOU" for all of your efforts during the last three years. We are pledged at over \$217,000 surpassing our goal of \$177,000. We have 6 Model Clubs with the possibility of one or two more if the Clubs pledge a little more per member.

22 D is the first District to reach 100% so we should be very proud of our Clubs knowing how the money raised will help so many people. GREAT JOB to one and all.

Lions Clubs Build 1,000th House with Habitat for Humanity *Milestone House 'Is Lionism at Its Best'*

Oak Brook, Illinois (May 22, 2008) –Lions Clubs International Foundation and Habitat for Humanity International are celebrating the construction of the 1,000th house built together worldwide since the partnership between the two organizations began in 2000. The house will be built in a week with Lion members, other local volunteers and Habitat for Humanity of the Magic Valley in south central Idaho. Construction will begin May 31, and a dedication is scheduled for June 6.

LCIF has pledged \$12 million to Habitat for Humanity to build houses with individuals and families living with physical and mental disabilities. Funding from LCIF and Lions members has enabled families in the United States, South Korea, New Zealand, the Philippines, Zambia, Ivory Coast, Sri Lanka, Romania, Canada, Belize, India, Hungary and Australia to have a simple, decent and healthy place in which to live.

"Lions have long been serving the needs of the less fortunate in their own communities and worldwide," said LCIF chair-
